A WORD FROM PASTOR STEVE:

"Choose for yourselves today whom you will serve...." (Joshua 24:15)

Graduation is a rite of passage unlike any other. When graduating from high school, you move from being treated like a child to being counted an adult, both in society and in any academic setting you might enter. Colleges aren't even allowed to discuss your grades with your parents apart from your consent. Childhood is over. Adulthood beckons.

Graduation from college brings more adult decisions to be made. What do I do now? Do I relocate for better opportunities? Which job will best suit my interests and desires? But most importantly (and the only questions that should be asked), what would God have me to do and where would He have me to do it?

How should you respond to the blessing and challenge?

Above any response is this – seek to fulfill God's will for your life and to glorify Him! With that said, let me throw out a few reminders for along the journey.

The first is this - Own Your Faith.

If you come from a Christian home, you have benefited tremendously from a host of supportive circumstances (household rules, numerous protections, church life). Testing awaits as you enter the world. It won't be enough to ride the coat tails of your parents' faith. If you're not sure about Christianity, now is the time to settle the matter (Ecclesiastes 12:1). Christianity is a faith unlike any other because it's based on historical events that were verifiable to thousands of people in Christ's day (1 Corinthians 15:3–6, 12–14) — some of whom died for what they would have known to be false, had it been false. If you have doubts, ask away. The existence of God, the reliability of the Bible, the resurrection of Jesus, Jesus being the only way to God — there is a wealth of material which addresses these and other questions.

But do you want to base your life on Jesus Christ? You'll soon encounter new opportunities to misuse God's good gifts in ways that seem alluring — that seem to offer immediate pleasure. Will you believe the lie that God is a cosmic killjoy, out to rob you from experiencing the good things of life (Genesis 3:6)? Or will you trust that the One who made you knows best, that His rules are an expression of His love, and that His ways lead to your greatest happiness (Psalm 16:11)?

Next, you need to - Own Your Relationships. The Christian faith is lived out in community. So you'll need to find a good church. Somewhere you can worship, learn, grow, and serve. Somewhere you can form friendships and where you can be a friend. Look at a few church websites before you leave home. Check out their beliefs, listen to their sermons, and be aware of their ministries. Make church attendance a priority early. It's a harder habit to form later.

At college and in later life, the easiest friendships aren't always the best. To become wise, you need to walk (or do life) with the wise (Proverbs 13:20). Look for others who share your commitment to the things of God and faithfully invest in them. Relational evangelism is worth pursuing, especially at college, but make sure you also nurture friendships that strengthen your faith (Proverbs 27:17). We're commanded to be salt and light (Matthew 5:13–16) — which presupposes we are salt and light. To make a difference in the world we must be different than the world. Holiness in lifestyle, combined with a gracious demeanor, provide a winsome alternative to the wasteland of hedonism and materialism that are rampant on college campuses and youth culture in general.

And finally - Own Your Decisions.

Assessing situations, weighing alternatives, and thinking critically are like using muscles. Flabbiness comes from disuse; strength comes through practice. The next few years are full of choices — which college (or trade) to pursue, what to study, how to pay for it, and more, which job to accept and

where to relocate to, if needed. It might be nice if God spoke with an audible voice at each crossroads, but that's not been my experience. We should pray (James 1:5). We should seek counsel from trustworthy people who know us (Proverbs 15:22). We should consider where we've been successful and what activities we enjoy, as these point to where, over time, we might be most useful in this world for the good of others and the glory of God.

Panicked that you'll miss God's will? God wants us to follow Him more than we do. His moral will is revealed in the Bible. His sovereign will is revealed as we live it. So make the best decisions you can based on sound judgment, accept the consequences, learn from any missteps, and trust God to shower you with mercy and goodness (Psalm 23:6). With God no path is without difficulty and no path is without blessing.

"I was born January 1974 in Barbourville, KY; the foothills of the

Appalachian Mountains & the Cumberland Gap. In 2005 moved to Nashville, TN where my family and I resided for 10 years. Then we packed up the wagons and went west now living in Dallas, TX.

I started this journey in 1996 pursuing full time music evangelism. From the beginnings in a small, rural town of Barbourville, KY, music and the church have always been a part of who I am. I was singing at the age of 3 and playing the piano at 4, but at 14 I realized that a lifelong "church goer" wouldn't make you a "Heaven goer"! That is where I began my walk with the Lord.

Sometimes it's a challenge to walk in the path that God has before us. Why, because life happens. We are real people

living in a real world with real problems. I know what it's like to be a teenager and diagnosed with bipolar disorder and wrestle with depression, anxiety, fear, and hopelessness. However, I always knew God had a plan, but I questioned where He was. I was exhausted by other's comments "...God knows what's going on...God's going to take care of this..." at which I would then mentally process a reply, "If God really knew what was going on then why hasn't he done something!"

Mary and Martha felt the same way after they sent for Jesus to come and heal their brother Lazarus. It appeared Jesus was 4 days late. Lazarus had died. But, when you have the Resurrection in your presence "it's all good"! You may think Jesus is late but His watch is not broken. And I suppose you can say He showed up right on time for me, too!

A final thought for those of you who may struggle with this and similar disorders; in addition to seeking God, please seek out professional counseling and medical treatment. I did both!

On another note, I married a TEXAN! That's not a big deal unless you are from Texas! In 2005 Melissa and I signed the line "for better or worse, in sickness and health". You know the phrases. It's when life happens words must become actions. Case in point during 2008, with Melissa about 5 months pregnant, we were told our little girl would be born with Down's syndrome. While all children, regardless of how they are "packaged", are a gift from God, the roller coaster of emotions was set into motion. We opted for a second opinion and the test indicated the "markers" or indicators for Down's syndrome had more than tripled. Take note that one of the markers for Down's syndrome are excessive folds of skin on the back of the neck. We saw all the markers with our own eyes but asked for one last option, an amniocentesis. At this time we were asked if the test came back positive if we were considering terminating the pregnancy.

Over our adult lives we had been critical and perhaps judgmental of those who had chosen to end pregnancies for whatever reason. This was not an option for us. But, let me tell you the anguish of processing those moments was difficult. Our Faith was in test but not in question.

After the third test and a two week wait, the results were in. It was "all good"! The doctors thought they made a mistake but we know God intervened!

Now remember those excessive folds of skin on the back of the neck? When Emme Blu was born, two weeks early, she weighed 9 lbs. 13oz. The excessive folds were FAT! Praise the Lord for FAT!

Within days of that big delivery, I felt something wasn't right with her cranium and parental instincts kicked in pretty fast for this first time dad. At 4 days old we brought that to the attention of her pediatrician. Instantly, we were referred to a plastics and neurosurgeon. She had Metopic Craniosynostosis. In simpler terms she did not have a "soft spot" in the middle suture that goes from the forehead to the crown. It had already closed and calcified, therefore surgery was necessary. At 5 1/2 months old Emme had a craniofacial reconstruction.

The first morning post-op when I walked into the hospital room I did not recognize Emme. Her head had swollen twice its normal size and my heart was torn out of my chest. But after nine days at Vanderbilt Children's Hospital, we brought home a healthy happy baby girl. She is now 5 years old and you can see from the picture above, she's beautiful.

I know this is a bit lengthy but I want you to see not what we've been through, but what God has done! There is no pity where there is praise! There is no helplessness when there is Hope! And there is no fear where there is faith!

My final thought is simple. The will of God will not lead you where the grace of God can't keep you." http://www.shannonbunch.com/
